Anthony Award for Best Crime Novel in the US

THE BRUTAL TELLING (book 5) has just won the Anthony Award for Best Crime Novel in the United States. I would use another exclamation mark but my agent and editor would dock me my advance, and then kill me. Perhaps even eat me.



The Anthony Awards were announced at the crime readers/writers convention Bouchercon in San Francisco a couple of weeks ago. I was so flabbergasted I hadn't prepared anything to say. So once again my goal of simply staying conscious and continent kicked in.

Mission accomplished. All I remember is kissing Michael, bounding up the stair, striding across a stage the size of a football field, turning, then looking out at hundreds and hundreds of people. We'd been sitting in the front of the hall for the banquet so I really hadn't appreciated just how many people were there.

It's a very strange feeling to be staring at hundreds of people. And have them staring at me.

All of us speechless.

As I'd walked across the very large stage I'd repeated to myself, 'Quick, think of something clever to say.' Then, as the podium got closer, 'Quick, think of something amusing to say.' As I reached it, before I turned, I prayed, 'Just don't say anything stupid.'

Then, as I looked at all of them looking at me, the final prayer. 'Just say something, for God's sake.'

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
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The Brutal Telling UK, Canada and the Commonwealth

Quebec City - Bury Your Dead book launch

Michael and I ended the month of October in Toronto at the International Festival of Authors, then an event in Orangeville and finally - the culmination of a month of touring - in the magnificent, glorious Quebec City.

Where better to do the Quebec launch of this very Quebec book than at the scene of the crime?

BURY YOUR DEAD is set mostly within the walls of old Quebec City. A place steeped in history and built on bones and irony. At one stage I describe Quebec as a rowboat society - moving forward but looking back.

I think Quebec is not unique in that. Nor is there necessarily anything wrong with looking back. The key, of course, is not to be tethered to the past.

The body of a famous and quite sensationally eccentric amateur archeologist is found partly buried in the basement of the Literary and Historical Society - an Anglo island in an ocean of French. This man's murder ignites more than one mystery, including one of the great mysteries in Quebec history.

Whatever happened to the body of Samuel de Champlain, the father of Quebec? Where is he buried? And why has his body disappeared? The amateur archeologist spent his career in the monomaniacal pursuit of those old bones.

And now he himself is dead.


Could this 400 year old body contain a secret so terrible someone would kill to keep him buried? What exactly is hiding under the genteel façade of old Quebec City?

And what is hiding beneath the Literary and Historical Society?




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Cruelest Month


I had been scheduled to be at the Miami BookFair but there was a last minute scheduling conflict and it wasn't possible. Next year, we hope!

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
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
