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

Over on the [Facebook page](#) we had the fun of slowly revealing the cover over four days, using short video clips. And then, on the final day, the full image.



The Long Way Home - about the book

And now I can also tell you something about THE LONG WAY HOME. (but not too much, I promise).

Happily retired in the village of Three Pines, Armand Gamache, former Chief Inspector of the Homicide with the Sûreté du Québec, has found a peace he'd only imagined possible. On warm summer mornings he sits on a bench holding a small book, THE BALM IN GILEAD, in his large hands. "There is a balm in Gilead," his neighbor Clara Morrow reads from the dust jacket, "to make the wounded whole."

How The Light Gets In
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While Gamache doesn't talk about his wounds and his balm, Clara tells him about hers. Peter, her artist husband, has failed to come home. Failed to show up as promised on the first anniversary of their separation. She wants Gamache's help to find him. Having finally found sanctuary, Gamache feels a near revulsion at the thought of leaving Three Pines. "There's power enough in Heaven," he finishes the quote as he contemplates the quiet village, "to cure a sin-sick soul." And then he gets up. And joins her.

Together with his former second-in-command, Jean-Guy Beauvoir, and Myrna Landers, they journey deeper and deeper into Quebec. And deeper and deeper into the soul of Peter Morrow. A man so desperate to recapture his fame as an artist, he would sell that soul. And may have. The journey takes them further and further from Three Pines, to the very mouth of the great St. Lawrence river. To an area so desolate, so damned, the first mariners called it The land God gave to Cain. And there they discover the terrible damage done by a sin-sick soul.



But I think I had the better time. Left Coast Crime was magnificent! So much fun, such great writers including my friends Deborah Crombie, Rhys Bowen, Jacqueline Winspear, Ann Cleeves. And other friends, Lesa Holstein, Janet Rudolph, Bill and Toby, Chris Aldrich and so many others.

At the end of the long days Michael, Doug and I would collapse in the room and share stories of our adventures.

My publisher, Andy Martin, of Minotaur Books, flew in from New York City to do a wonderful onstage feature interview with me (pictured above) - wish I could say it was hard work, but clearly it was simply loads of fun.
