



In their choice of books to read together, mother and son also chose intimate topics to discuss. They got to know not just the books, but each other.

It's a funny, smart, truthful book, that is not at all maudlin or depressing. Just the opposite.

As you can imagine, I'm looking forward to that. It's at the Leacock Building at McGill, at 5:30 on May 7th. You're welcome to join us. No ticket is necessary and it's free.

Later in May it's back to New York City for BookExpo America. I hear BEA is overwhelming. I'll be sure to pack my allies, the gummie bears.

At noon on May 30th I'll be one of the speakers at the Librarians Lunch and then that evening Ralph Cosham and I will go to the Audie Awards!

As you might know, Ralph has been nominated for a Audie Award for his recording of THE BEAUTIFUL MYSTERY and I'm going (with the permission of his wife and Michael) as his date. SO pleased for him, and for the book. I know many of you are huge fans of Ralph and how he brings the characters and setting alive. We'll let you know, via Facebook, how it goes. The Audies are the audio equivalent of the Oscars - so this is big.

More crossed fingers.

And then, if we survive the night, I've been invited to speak the next day, Friday May 31st, at the audio tea at BookExpo America. I might just move my lips and ask Ralph to provide the words.


### **BURY YOUR DEAD - Quebec City guided tour**
